2.6. Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The institution has been adopting several innovative steps with the avowed aim to make the teaching-learning process more effective.

The foremost among these have been the updating of the routine at regular intervals, use of smart classrooms, taking necessary steps to get wall magazines published by the students of various departments under the supervision of the teachers, analysis of test results and counselling of students based on the results of the analysis, regularly holding remedial coaching and tutorial classes for weaker sections of the students, felicitation of students who have scored more than 60 % marks in the university examinations.

The college encourages the utmost usage of latest technology at its disposal so that the most advanced form of education can be provided to students. The ICT-enabled classroom is regularly used by several teachers of various departments with this end in view.

College provides support services to SC, ST, OBC, as well as economically weaker and physically disabled students and provides them with the facility of coaching classes so that they can successfully tackle various competitive exams and skill development courses. Support is also given to slow learners. Support services are provided to students for facing difficult examinations like the NET and the SET.

The central library has been fully overhauled. Apart from physical books, it now includes 6000+ e-journals titles and 31,35,000+ e-book titles which can be accessed online under the N-LIST registration. 168 text books, 3 reference books, and 14 journals have been added to the 101 journals taking the total to 115. Moreover, 516 digital databases have been newly added, taking the total to 12996.

The IQAC contributes its bit in improving the teaching-learning process via the following measures, namely routine updating at regular intervals, use of Smart classrooms, taking active part in getting wall magazines published by the students of various departments, analysis of test results and counselling of students, holding remedial coaching and tutorial classes for weaker section of the students. The IQAC ensures transparency and accountability by disseminating information among students through website, prospectus, and notice boards in the campus. Concerned with the performances of students, the IQAC provides utmost support to slow learners as well. Support services are provided to students in order to enable them to face examinations like NET, SET. The IQAC helps maintain the structured mechanism the institution has for career guidance and placement of students in the form of Entry in Service scheme granted by UGC. The IQAC also maintains regular contact and interaction with the students' union of the college so as to remain abreast of the various needs and demands of the students. The overall cleanliness of the campus is also carefully monitored by the IQAC. The NLIST registration has made it possible for teachers and students to access online 6000 e-journals and more than 31,35,000+ e-books, 12996 digital databases. IQAC also monitors the preparation and publication of the Annual academic calendar and the college prospectus. The IQAC further encourages teachers in updating and enriching themselves continuously by regular research work, participation in Refresher Courses and Short-time Courses, etc..

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1.State the Vision and Mission of the institution:

This institution, since its inception, has been committed to the mission of imparting enlightenment to the maximum number of young learners. This has been a difficult endeavour to pursue particularly because the institution is located in a remote region, far away from the capital city of the state, and hence, deprived of several essential amenities and afflicted by overwhelming handicaps. Nevertheless, the institution has been pursuing its mission, undeterred, through the last seventy years and unfalteringly charting its path as a leader dedicated to lead its retinue to the fulfilment of their dreams of achieving higher education. In the present century, characterised by giant leaps in the field of information technology, this institution continues its triumphant surge, driven by the determination of providing the most technologically advanced education to its students most of whom hold from rural backwaters deprived of technological developments. ICT-compliant classrooms, online admission of students, a Wi-Fi-enabled campus, etc. are some of the ambitious visions that enable this institution sustain its journey in the 21st Century.

- (i)The institute makes partial use of the Management Information System, though there is no specific software concerning this System.
- (ii) Data of students enrolled in the college are duly updated.
- (iii) The filling up of admission forms online is done through the CAS (4.0) software.
- (iv) All information relevant to students, e.g. publication of results, filling up of admission forms online, registration to the University, etc. are duly uploaded in the college website.
- (v) The salary of the entire college staff is dispensed through the HRMS software.
- (vi) Internal audit and update of financial accounts are done through software.
- (vii) The college library runs on the SOUL (2.0) software.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1. Curriculum Development:

Every department prepares its own annual academic calendar which they revise and update every year. Flexibility in choosing subject combinations is ensured. The college encourages the faculty members (member of Board of Studies) to participate in UG Board of Studies meeting. The faculty members are always encouraged to attend workshops on curriculum restructuring and modification.

6.3.2. Teaching and Learning:

Teachers employ the best practices in teaching and learning alongside engaging students actively amongst themselves as well as faculty members. Periodic assessments are made to evaluate their academic performances. Teachers also make use of modern tools of technological sophistication. Other techniques employed to enhance teaching-learning include up-gradation of library, giving impetus to class presentations, students' seminars, wall magazines, group discussions, debates, special lectures and field visits. Teachers are provided opportunities to attend Refresher/Orientation Programmes. The Academic in-charge looks after the academic activities and ensures that they are conducted uninterruptedly. Dr. Chittaranjan Das, Head, Dept. of Sanskrit, has uploaded 23 YouTube links for help in teaching new texts included in the syllabus of the subject. At the Institutional level initiatives are taken to achieve better overall development of the students. Academic Calendar is prepared by the various Departments at the beginning of the session to keep students a fair idea of about the annual schedule of topics to be covered in the class. Parent-teachers' meetings are held at the middle of the session by the Departments to make parents/ guardians aware of the situation of their ward with respect to their academic progress. Regularity record of students is duly maintained by the Departments and students, who are frequently absent, is informed to meet the head of the department concerned along with letters from guardians, authenticating the reason for the absence. Tutorial classes are arranged for the academically backward students where their individual problems are addressed. Departments organize class tests at regular intervals to assess their development / improvement. Continuous internal assessment is done for lab-based subjects in Practical papers. Students are directed to visit the upgraded College Library regularly. Students are motivated to make seminar presentations on innovative as well as relevant topics in their respective Departments to facilitate their academic and personality development.

6.3.4. Research and Development :

Principal investigators of ongoing Research Projects are provided adequate autonomy in conducting research work. The teachers are encouraged to take up Major and Minor Research Projects. At various points of time members from different faculties are encouraged to join Faculty Development Programmes. The Research Cell is guides and encourages the faculty members to apply for financial grant to different agencies like UGC, DST etc. Teachers are encouraged to participate in relevant seminars and workshops. Students are also motivated to take up research projects under the guidance of their departmental teachers. Three of the teachers have been awarded Ph.D. degrees, namely Sri Bablu Roy of the Department of Botany, Sri Chandrakanta Biswas and Sri Sushen Mondal, both assistant professors of the Department of Philosophy. The following teachers have submitted their dissertations: Sri Partha Sarathi Dey, Assistant professor, Department of Political Science; Sri Subhasis Goswami, Assistant Professor, Department of Chemistry; Md. Ajimul Hoque, Assistant Professor, Department of Bengali, Smt. Piyali Das, Assistant Professor, Department of Anthropology. A Major Project in Zoology, titled “ *Contribution in India on climate change research in comparison with major countries: a Bibliometrics study of 30 years (1987-2016)*” has been approved by the Department of Science and Technology in favour of Dr. Ajoy Mallik, Assistant Professor, Zoology in June 2018.

6.3.5. Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation :

The college utilizes the grants of UGC, State Government Grants and College Funds for library updating, purchase of books for central as well as departmental libraries. The NLIST registration has made it possible for teachers and students to access 6000 e-journals and more than 31,35,000+ e-books online, and a total of 12996 digital databases. The central library now has 15,165 text books, 2800 reference books, 115 issues of journals, 74 Braille books, 12 CDs and 3 DVDs. The college also provides funds for purchasing and maintaining laboratory equipment and other items required for departmental needs. Earnest efforts are made to provide ICT facilities; computerization of library has been achieved. Steps are taken to ensure regular maintenance of other physical infrastructures. The library has devoted 2 of its 6 computers, equipped with Internet connectivity and OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) facility, for exclusive use by students so that they may smoothly search books and documents.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management :

Various committees have been formed with both teaching and non-teaching faculties as members to assist in the daily administration of the college. All records pertaining to the staff are meticulously maintained, including salary, PF, Leave, etc. The faculty are regularly motivated to upgrade themselves through active participation in Refresher Courses and Orientation Programmes, seminars and workshops, and Faculty Development Programmes.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment :

Teachers have been appointed in various departments, where teaching posts had been lying vacant as per recommendations of the West Bengal College Service Commission. 2 teachers have been appointed in one in Bengali and one in Chemistry.
